Researching Chinese American WW2 Ancestors

Managing Your Research & Leveraging Unique Resources

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An estimated 16,000 – 20,000 Chinese Americans served during World War Two. Researching their wartime and veteran stories presents some unique challenges. This presentation discusses strategies and methods to find, manage, and better leverage the ever-increasing availability of WW2 records and resources to further your research. (*Use this handout for note-taking and as a future reference*.)

OBJECTIVES

Attendees should come away with the following:

- an appreciation for the challenges associated with researching WW2 ancestors.
- strategies and methods for researching the wartime and post-war experiences of WW2 ancestors.
- an understanding of the wide variety of records and related resources available.

CHINESE AMERICAN SERVICE IN WW2

The number of Chinese Americans who served during WW2 has not yet been definitively determined and most estimates lack citations. According to a 1950 government report on WW2 Selective Service¹, a total of 15,998 Chinese registrants enlisted or were inducted:

- 14,377 in the Army. (This number includes the Army Air Forces.)
- 1,621 in the Navy. (This number likely includes Marines)

In 1996, COL (retired) William F Strobridge, who previously served as Chief Historian for the Center of Military History, estimated a range of 15,000 to 20,000 Chinese Americans served.² Approximately 10% served in Chinese American units (14th Air Service Group and 987th Special Communications Signal Co.)

CHALLENGES

Burned Official Military Personnel Files (OMPF) – 1973 Fire at NARA-St Louis

- Navy and Marine Corps files were not damaged!
- Army: those discharged 1 Nov 1912 31 Dec 1959 = estimated 80% loss.
- Air Force: those discharged 25 Sep 1947 31 Dec 1963 (surnames Hubbard Z) = est. 75% loss.

Never assume a file doesn't exist. B-files (burned files) & R-files (reconstructed files) are still helpful.

Other Challenges

- Family papers tossed or scattered.
- Access to digitized records, websites, and social media resources come and go.
- Names of Chinese Americans were frequently mispronounced, misspelled and/or mis-ordered.
- Some collections are organized by military unit, so you have to know your person's unit(s).
 - US Army Morning Reports (currently being digitized and will hopefully available next year.)
 - Unit-specific records at the National Archives (College Park), the Air Force Historical Research Agency (Maxwell AFB, Montgomery AL), and various museums/archives.

STRATEGIES & METHODS - Everything is a clue. Everything.

Harvest Known Info

- Consolidate any documents, photos, letters, medals, etc. that you have.
- Log both what you know and what is unconfirmed, such as family stories. (Annotate accordingly.)

Use a Simple Timeline

This is key to the effective search and analysis of military records.

Simplicity = Clarity. Gaps and connections will be easier to spot.

- Date + Age + Event + Source
- Only 1-2 lines per entry
- Include location (if known) with the event
- Color code relevant historic events and those involving family

Helpful hint: Keep links on the following page, by category: Records, References, Newspaper Articles, Other, Photos.

Prioritize Service Vitals

Service vitals are the military service equivalent to birth-marriage-death.

- Serial Number = important in verifying that you have the correct person.
- Service dates = enlistment/induction, assignments & overseas movements, and discharge.
- Unit(s) = your person likely served with more than one unit.

Abstract Records

Abstract each record or item. *Read collection descriptions*. Don't guess what abbreviations, acronyms, and terms mean (research them). Use Google. Use Wikipedia (verify the article is well sourced). Here is an unofficial, but helpful, resource for WW2 military abbreviations (all services):

Analyze in Service Blocks

Don't overload trying to search or grasp someone's WW2 experience all at once. Think in service blocks:

Consider Context

- Legislation. Policies. Major wartime events. Theater of Operations. Even mundane details.
- Personal and family events. Even if your person was away from home, these add nuance to their story.

Key events reference (basic)

01 Sep 1939	WW2 begins with the invasion of Poland by Nazi forces (with major Luftwaffe support).		
Spring 1940	Belgium, Holland, Luxembourg, & France fall to Germany (May/Jun 1940).		
16 Sep 1940	Selective Training & Service Act. First peace-time draft. Obligation is 12 months active service.		
16 Oct 1940	1st Registration (R-Day). Registration of men 21 - 35, inclusive. Over 16 million men register.		
21 Aug 1941	Draftees extended to 18 months, resulting in Over the Hill in October (OHIO) protests.		
07 Dec 1941	Pearl Harbor is attached. U.S. declares war on Japan (8 Dec).		
11 Dec 1941	Germany and Italy declare war on the U.S. The U.S. reciprocates.		
20 Dec 1941	Men aged 18 - 64 required to register; those 20 - 44 liable for selection. Duration plus 6 months.		
09 Mar 1942	The War Department is reorganized into the three components: Army Air Forces,		
	Army Ground Forces, and Service of Supply (later renamed Army Service Forces).		
27 Mar 1942	Second War Powers Act exempts aliens serving honorably from most naturalization requirements		
	except proof of legal entry.		
13 Nov 1942	Men 18 -19 become liable for service.		
05 Dec 1942	Executive Order 9279 ends voluntary enlistment for ages 18 – 38.		
22 Dec 1944	58 Stat. 886 exempts aliens serving honorably from providing proof of legal entry to naturalize.		
08 May 1945	V-E Day. Victory in Europe. (Announced and surrender signed.)		
15 Aug 1945	V-J Day. Victory in Japan announced, with surrender on 2 Sep. Dates are 14 Aug & 1 Sep in U.S.		
28 Dec 1945	Passage of War Brides Act allows alien spouses/children to enter US as non-quota immigrants.		
15 Oct 1946	Army suspends draft call-ups. (The Navy and USMC had stopped the previous May.)		
31 Mar 1947	Expiration of the Selective Training and Service Act.		

LOCATING OFFICIAL MILITARY RECORDS (Federal and State)

Ancestry.com

- Subscription. Check if local libraries subscribe to the Ancestry Library Edition.
- Searching 'Military Records': only returns indexed records.
- Using the Card Catalog returns all cataloged records (my preferred method):
 Filter by Military + United States (or State) + Time Period. Sort by Title or Records Count.
 To see what's new: Sort the Catalog by Date Updated, then filter by Military + United States
- The U.S. Military Collection: (indexed only) https://www.ancestry.com/cs/militaryrecords

<u>Tip</u>: Don't forget to search public trees. You may find military documents or photos posted.

FamilySearch.org

- Free. Some restrictions due to contracts.
- Searching by a person's name returns only indexed records.
- To see view all published (reviewed) military collections:
 Click Search at top of homepage > select 'Records' > Scroll to Find a Collection > click 'Browse all collections' > Filter by Military + United States (or State) + 1900-1949.
 To see what's new: click 'Last Updated' twice to sort by most recently added and updated collections.
- Each collection has a corresponding Research Wiki page. Click 'How to Use This Collection.'

Fold3.com

- Subscription. Check if local libraries subscribe. Some offer remote patron access.
- Homepage has 'tiles.' Select World War II (United States), then use search box.
- To see what WW2 collections they have, click 'Publications'. You can then explore each publication.
- To search more specifically, click Search at top of Fold3 homepage, then use filter options on left.
- To access see what's new: click New & Updated Collections tile on Fold3 homepage.
- Strongly recommended: "Fold3 Training" tile on homepage. Fold3 Blog at https://blog.fold3.com .

National Archives (NARA) - https://www.archives.gov

- Free. Limited digitization, of which most are not OCR searchable or have limited indexing.
- Of note is the "Access to Archival Databases" (AAD) section: https://aad.archives.gov/aad/
 The AAD collections are archival electronic records created via punch cards. Many are available via the above websites, but the AAD provides better background and codes information.
- The catalog search function was recently updated and can be a <u>steep</u> learning curve.

 From the homepage: 'Research Our Records' > Search the Catalog > Enter your search terms.

WW2 RECORDS - Sampling for reference. Not discussed in detail.

A = Ancestry.com, FS = FamilySearch.org, F3 = Fold3.com, N = Archives.gov (National Archives)

Recommended Initial Search

- Draft Cards of Young Men. Men age 18-44, inclusive. All states except Maine. (A, F3)
- <u>Draft Cards of Old Men</u>. Men age 45-64, inclusive. (Men born 27 Apr 1877 16 Feb 1897.) All states except AL, FL, GA, ME, MS, NM, NC, SC, TN. (A, F3)
- <u>BIRLS (Beneficiary Identification Records Locator Subsystem) Death File</u>. Lists information for deceased individuals who had received VA benefits *while alive*. (A, F3)
- Army Enlistment 'Records' Database (aka Army Serial Number File, 1938-1946).
 Provides service entrance data of most, but not all, WWII Army personnel. (A, F3, FS)

- Military Headstone Applications. The form changed overtime. (A to 1985, FS to 1970)
- <u>US Veteran Grave Sites</u>. Compilation of information from military cemeteries. (A)
- Headstone and Internment Records for US Military Cemeteries on Foreign Soil, 1942-1949. (A)
- WWII Army Deserters Pay Cards. (A)
- Hospital Admissions Cards. Army only. Type of info provided varies. (A, F3)
- (If applicable) Cadet Nursing Corps Cards, 943-1948. Not military, a federal training program. (F3)

Other Records

- Military Discharges (aka Reports of Separation). Collections are by state county. (FS)
- Various State Collections. Contents vary. Ancestry has IA & PA bonus/compensation records. (A, FS)
- Naturalization Petitions/Certifications (by state). Wartime service provided accelerated citizenship. (A)
- Officer Registers. all services. (A, F3)
- <u>US Navy Muster Rolls</u>. These by ship and by station/base. (A, F3)
- USMC Muster Rolls. These by ship and by station/base. (A, F3)
- US Navy Deck Logs (N) and US Navy War Diaries (F3)
- Missing Air Crew Reports (MACR). Army Air Forces. (F3, N)
- Escape & Evasion (E&E) Reports. Army & Army Air Forces. (N)
- <u>USAF Award Cards</u>. These include Army Air Forces personnel. (N)
- Prisoners of War Databases. (A, FS, N)
- POW/MIA Unaccounted For. (A, F3)
- USMC Casualty Index (F3), Army/AAF Casualty List (F3), and WWII War Dead (A, F3, N)

Search Tips to Mitigate Name Errors

- In the Army Enlisted Record collection (via Ancestry or NARA), search by fields not name.
- If a collection allows you to search by serial number, use that if a name search isn't successful.

WW2 RESOURCES – A sampling of what is out there.

- 1. Digitized Newspapers a key resource
- Free and subscription. Multiple websites: Chronicling America (free), Newspapers.com (\$), Genealogy Bank (\$), Accessible Archives (\$), university libraries (online collections),
- The WW2-era editions of the Stars & Stripes are available on Ancestry.
- Expand your search terms beyond your person's name. Consider searching for a unit, a type of unit, other people in the same unit, training bases & military facilities related to your person, post-war troop transport arrivals, other family members, even official news releases on legislation and policies.
- Hometown newspapers can provide community insights regarding local impacts and sentiments.
- 2. State Libraries, Archives, Historical Societies, University, and Other Archive Collections
- Free, wide variety of content. Explore the site; look for finding aides (call for help, if needed). Learn what is available online and in their non-digitized collections. May have a blog and/or podcast.
- Universities can have amazing donated collections, along with their own wartime and veteran-related records; may have yearbooks and alumni journals online.
